Climate Change – Education and Advocacy

Lowell and Harry Love – gave climate change presentations and willing to do them for other groups.

Chippo – acronym to describe threats to wildlife: climate change, habitat loss, invasive species, population, over-harvesting.

Susan Schneider, San Joaquin – recently attended a four day national convention for an informal climate change coalition – Sierra Club, and San Joaquin and League of Women Voters.

Climate Watch – nuthatches and bluebirds – species selected a problem

Our common home – in research that is one of the best buzz words for talking about environmental issues.

EcoAmerica.org – Bay Area nonprofit – connecting on climate

Barry, Central Sierra. Put an article in each newsletter – one bird at risk in each issue.

Robert and George, Fresno – Talk about personal role in climate change, like travelling around to look at birds. Personal pledge to reduce footprint.

Stanislaus

Tricolored Blackbird Survey in May – three sites

422 members. No one comes to general membership meeting. 1-2 programs a year. Advertised through Modesto Bee and newsletter.

Board is 11 members - 7 working members and 4 retirees.

Grayson scholarship provides funds for students at CSU Stanislaus.

Organized a fundraiser at historic State theater in Modesto - the Big Year. Sold a lot of booklets on Birding Sites of Stanislaus and Merced Counties.

Goals - Diversity in membership and board. And more outreach.

Birds and Brew idea – recruit young people.

Interested in starting a college chapter.

Central Sierra

Board is all retired. 3 or 4 board members will leave next year. New active program chair this year. Well-funded with \$100k in bank.

Educational program – presentations in elementary schools.

Conservation program – monitoring of local Tricolored Blackbird sites

Chapter provides \$4,000/year in scholarships.

Audubon group set up in local junior college.

Tulare

Attended the California Assembly and heard about BirdSeasons program. Program started in January. They monitor one route weekly and collect data on 8-9 species and put into National Phenology Network.

Four chapter members attended hearing of the Tulare County Board of Supervisors regarding proposal to reduce size of Giant Sequoia National Monument. Three chapter members spoke against proposal. One of the Supervisors is an attorney for a logging company. Over 50 people attended, many of them young Latinos. New coalition between environmental groups and social justice groups on this issue.

Another nonprofit, Wild Places, takes high school age Latino kids into nature and is now partnering with Tulare Audubon. Some of their volunteers will work with them on their BirdSeasons project.

Yosemite Area

Annual fundraiser – Nest box program. 440 nest boxes.

Education program – 950 kids go through program. Difficulty finding people who can go into classroom. Program was in 6 schools, now in 2 schools.

San Joaquin

Programs – 8/year. 60 field trips a year.

New Conservation Chair – monitoring developments in Delta Tunnels

Participated in Audubon California's Advocacy Day in Capitol.

Meetup group – 77 members

500 members. 420 National, 70-80 local. Membership has been declining.

Kern

Chapter has found that having campaign on something is a good way to build membership.

350 members. Bakersfield.

75 or sometimes over 100 for meetings. 2-3 field trips/month.

Three science camps on a preserve, geared toward school districts that are underprivileged. All kids were from agricultural area. All Hispanic, Muslim, no Anglo faces. Kern County is majority Hispanic. 30 minutes at each session. They are one of them.

500,000 people in Bakersfield. Middle of downtown – program room.
