TRACKING YOUR CHAPTER'S CLIMATE CHANGE ACTIONS & EVENTS



The Climate Initiative has partnered with the GIS team to create a new GeoForm tool that will illustrate just how much every action matters in our fight against climate change. INTERNATIONAL CLIMATE NEGOTIATIONS (COP21) & BIRDS



Audubon and our partners at BirdLife International just published "[The Messengers](#)", a synthesis of climate change impacts to birds around the world. The report draws on hundreds of peer-reviewed studies and outlines the existing and projected risks that global warming poses to birds and their habitats. To draw attention to birds during COP21, we've also launched a social media campaign called [#BirdsTellUs](#). The ask is clear: Don't let birds disappear from global conversations about climate change. We need your help to select our 2015 Bird of the Year. We have some great nominees below, but you can also write in your own choice if you wish. Votes will be accepted through Sunday, Dec. 20. You can vote as many times as you like. Each year, Audubon California asks the public to help us name our Bird of the Year. We created the Bird of the Year in 2009 to raise awareness about bird conservation in California. Typically, we name six finalists and post the poll online. Voters are free to choose one of these birds, or write in the bird of their choice. This is a conservation award. We're particularly interested in recognizing bird species that were of significant conservation interest in 2015, but that also had a compelling story and rallied the public around it.
